Eighth Week of Session

Unanimous Second Reading Vote Becoming a Habit on Bipartisan Initiatives

For the second week in a row, the House of Representatives voted unanimously for the passage of a bill, a feat which has left many in awe and hopeful for continued bipartisan efforts with important initiatives. <u>H.4919</u>, the early voting bill containing additional election reforms, received second reading on Wednesday by a vote of 114 – 0 and third reading yesterday before being sent to the Senate and referred to the Judiciary Committee (updated Fiscal Impact can be <u>reviewed here</u>).

As passed by the House, H.4919 would establish early in-person voting for the two weeks preceding any general election on Monday through Saturday from 8:30 am to 6:00 pm with each county's population and square mileage determining the number of early voting locations. Primary elections, special elections and all municipal elections must also be allowed to cast an early in-person ballot. Absentee ballot oaths would be required to have the printed name of the witness, in addition to their signature and address, and for anyone qualified to vote by absentee ballot, a new reason would be that a voter is going to be absent from their county of residence for the duration of the early voting period and on Election Day. Being on vacation during early voting or on Election Day would no longer be a valid reason for obtaining an absentee ballot. Absentee ballot applications would include the last four digits of the voter's social security number, and ballot delivery would require an authorized returnee to produce a current and valid form of government-issued photo identification. Provisional ballots could be cast by any voter who has already voted absentee, and the provisional ballot would be counted only if that voter's absentee ballot is not received in the county voter registration and election commission offices by 7:00 p.m. on Election Day.

Candidates for office would be prohibited from filing more than one intention of candidacy statement for an election, and candidates could not be nominated by more than one political party for a single office or have their name listed on a ballot more than once.

The State Election Commission would be required to update voter registration lists within seven days of the receipt of information disqualifying a registered voter, and when registering to vote, applicants would be required to take an additional oath that, to the best of their knowledge, are not already a registered voter in any other state. Input from the public, academia, public interest organizations, local election officials, and policy makers would be received before the purchase of new voting machines in the future. Voting machines would

additionally be prohibited from carrying any type of connection to the internet to ensure security, and optical scanners (if ever in use) would be required to meet specific standards.

Senate DHEC, DAODAS and DMH Restructuring Bill 10-years in the making moves forward

Yesterday, the full Senate Medical Affairs Committee gave a favorable as amended report to S.2, a bill creating two new state agencies: the Department of Behavioral and Public Health and the Department of Environmental Services.

Department of Behavioral Health

The Department of Health and Environmental Control (DHEC), the Department of Alcohol and Other Drug Abuse Services (DAODAS) and the Department of Mental Health (DMH) would become Divisions under the newly created Department of Behavioral Health in an effort to bring the health-related functions of those agencies together while separating out DHEC's environmental services. The authority to establish, manage, and operate veterans' homes shall also be transferred from DMH to the Department of Veterans' Affairs, a better fit for the management of all veterans' services. Spearheaded by Senate Finance Committee Chairman Harvey Peeler (R, Cherokee), this effort has been years in the making, as many believe DHEC overseeing two juggernaut functions of health and environmental regulation are too much for a single agency to effectively oversee and manage. Major events such as the 2015 "thousand-year flood" which washed away countless dams throughout the state and the myriad of public safety oversight DHEC was tasked with during the COVID-19 pandemic have created a renewed effort to restructure these agencies.

Department of Environmental Services

DHEC's current functions related to the regulation and protection of the environment would become divisions, offices and programs of the Department of Environmental Services (DES) under S.2. The hydrology and aquatic nuisance species programs currently under the Department of Natural Resources (DNR) would be transferred to the DES, and DNR's flood mitigation program would become a program of the Office of Resilience. All other DNR operations and programs would continue operating within DNR. The food safety program overseen by DHEC's Division of Food and Lead Risk Assessment and the Milk and Dairy Lab would become a division of the Department of Agriculture.

In speaking with Committee members at the hearing, current DHEC Director Dr. Edward Simmer voiced his support and said the agency would be ready to implement restructuring plans as directed by the General Assembly. Dr. Simmer noted the realignment would allow public health officials to work better together to help South Carolinians with serious substance abuse issues. S.2 received a favorable as amended report and will be up for second reading consideration in the Senate next week. Before moving on to other agenda items, Senator Brad Hutto (D, Orangeburg) congratulated Senator Peeler on S.2 taking a step forward, as Senator Peeler has been working on this restructuring plan for close to ten years.

Senate Tax Relief Bill on to full Finance

The Senate Finance Special Subcommittee on <u>S.1087</u>, the Senate tax relief bill, convened yesterday morning and gave the bill a favorable as amended report (the Fiscal Impact can be <u>reviewed here</u>). S.1087 would reduce the top individual state income tax rate from 7% to 5.7%, as well as eliminate any remaining income retirement income tax for military retirees, reduce the effective tax rate on manufacturing property to 6%, issue an approximately \$100 one-time rebate to state taxpayers and repeal certain outdated tax code sections.

During Subcommittee discussion, Senator Sean Bennett (R, Dorchester – likely Senate lead on major tax reform in the future) said it is not just about the rate but who pays it. He agreed with Senator Kevin Johnson (D, Clarendon) that South Carolina currently <u>does not</u> have one of the highest effective tax rates in the country, so the General Assembly should not be so focused on rates. Senator Bennett later stated that while he is in favor of lowering income tax rates and providing a rebate to the people of South Carolina, 5.7% is not enough, and he does not want the Senate to accept this as comprehensive tax reform. "Our tax policy is intricate and has tentacles everywhere because of our piecemeal approach to tax policy over the past 50 years," said Senator Bennett. "Let's not kid ourselves that this bill lives up to its name – it's an important piece of the Code, but it's not enough."

South Carolina Chamber of Commerce CEO Bob Morgan said the Chamber supports S.1087 as a mechanism to "get us closer to the vision of making our economy the most vibrant in the nation." Senator Tom Davis (R, Beaufort – Senate floor leader on S.1087 when debate is taken up) said the most commendable parts of S.1087 are that it takes a massive amount of revenue and returns it to the taxpayers instead of spending it. "Economists talk about scarcity, and from my standpoint the most effective yield from this money comes from the private sector. If money is spent there, it has to be efficient, but when money is spent by the state, we only think to throw more money at problems. I think the one-time money and the change of tax basis could return us back to a more productive South Carolina. We exempt more sales tax than we collect, and I want to move this bill as a practical matter so we can get it moved to a joint committee."

Full House Education and Public Works holds second hearing on CRT Bills

Tuesday afternoon, the full House Education and Public Works Committee held its <u>second public hearing on the five bills addressing Critical Race Theory</u>. Committee Chairlady Rita Allison (R, Spartanburg) noted 50 people were signed up ready to testify and each would be allowed three minutes to speak. Throughout the hearing, Committee members asked questions of some of those testifying and made comments which led to debate, and Chairlady Allison reminded members that this was a listening session only and not time to debate. A third and likely final public hearing to receive testimony will be held next Tuesday, March 8th an hour after the House adjourns.

Senate sets Convention of States bill for Special Order

Just before adjourning for the week yesterday, Senate Majority Leader and Rules Committee Chairman Shane Massey (R, Edgefield) moved to make H.3205 a Special Order bill pursuant to Senate Rule 33B. The Rule allows

a bill to be polled out of the Committee on Rules via vote by Committee members only, which was agreed to by a 14-member vote comprised of nine ayes, five nays and three members not voting.

As amended by the Senate Judiciary Committee, the Joint Resolution would allow the General Assembly to apply to Congress under the provisions of Article V of the Constitution of the United States for the calling of a convention of the states limited to proposing amendments to the Constitution of the United States that impose fiscal restraints on the federal government, limit the power and jurisdiction of the federal government and limit the terms of office for its officials and for members of Congress. At least 34 states must make a similar request before action will be taken.

The Senate will convene at 2:00 pm next Tuesday, March 8th instead of its standard meeting time of 12:00 noon to begin debate of the bill.
